Projects could explore:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Economic crime controls and human rights - The impact of anti-corruption, anti-money laundering and/or counter-terrorist financing regimes on individuals or groups</li><li>• Non-state actors in international law - The role of corporations and other non-state actors in international law formation, implementation and/or change</li><li>• Corporate criminal laws and reforms - The history, content and direction of efforts to control corporate power through the criminal law or allied regulatory strategies in particular states, like Australia</li><li>• Business and human rights initiatives - The formation and/or implementation of the so-called Ruggie Principles and related efforts to limit the harmful impact of investment, especially in the Global South</li><li>• Other projects on the transnational regulation of economic crime, transnational criminal law or transnational legal theory, including applied studies of transnational legal ordering"</li></ul>
